

I would like to encourage as many of you as possible to attend the upcoming Napa Tour.

I have mapped out as many little known roads as possible to make this tour <u>especially</u> interesting.

We will gather at the **Coddingtown Parking Lot at 9:30 a.m.**, and will leave sharply at 10 a.m.

Our first stop will be the Paoletti Winery on Silverado Trail Road.

They will open their very elegant wine cave at 11:30 a.m. for a self guided tour!

Their wine caves are lined with marble statuary busts of everybody you have ever known or read about, from the Pope, to Nikita Khrushchev!

It is quite interesting!

Following the wine cave tour, we will gather at their beautiful lake and picnic patio for lunch.

Please bring your own bag lunch (sandwich, or other)

and a dish to share (salad, beverages, side, desert, etc.).

We will bring paper plates, plastic utensils, a folding table for the food, and cold drink cups.

We will depart Paoleti Winery at 1 p.m. and tour South on some interesting back roads to St. Helena, stopping for a short visit to the St. Helena Olive Oil Company (built in 1931). This unique little place, on a back street, hosts a very old stone olive oil press and the remains of the rail car tracks that would deliver olives for crushing! There you can purchase unique cheeses, different olive oils, and other Italian food items.

Next stop is the old Bale Grist Mill State Park. The Mill and water wheel (Built in 1851) has been beautifully restored, and will be grinding grain that day in a wonderful demonstration of the technology of the day!

The entrance fee is \$8.00 per person, so be prepared with some cash.

We will return home on several more unique back roads, but will eventually cross back to Santa Rosa on Chalk Hill Road. We should be home by 4 or 4:30 p.m.














Stan Hywet Car Show

On Father's Day, my cousin invited me to a car show which is held annually on Father's Day at Stan Hywet Hall, a manor house in Akron, Ohio. Patty and I were in Ohio attending a family reunion. Stan Hywet was built on a 70-acre estate in 1912 by F.A. Seiberling, a co-founder of the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Co. It was their 64th annual car show.

The car show struck me as unusual in several respects. First, spectators had to pay an entrance fee. The fee

was \$16 per person. The show was sold out in advance; there were no walk-ins on the day of the show. Second, 6,300 tickets were sold for the one-day event. (If you do the math, that amounts to a nice chunk of change for the organizers---over \$100,000.) There was no on-site parking. Attendees were bussed in on shuttles. Third, with about 400 cars on display, there were only four Model T's. Because it is the 100th anniversary of the Lincoln, there was a nice collection of Lincolns. However, the majority of cars displayed were muscle cars of the 60's and 70's, with a scattering of Corvettes and a few exotics. (Think Ferrari).





Among the Model T's was a nice 1915 Runabout, another Runabout, a fire truck and a wood-bodied hearse complete with a coffin. As I said, it was an unusual car show and we spent about four hours walking among the cars displayed on a large grass field.
